## Tyger, Tyger Poem Activity



In the Tyger, Tyger poem the poet wonders who could have made a creature as powerful and mighty as the tiger.

- What do you notice about how each verse is written?
- Think about the first two lines of the first and last verses - the bright tiger in the 'forest of the night' perhaps use colour to make your tiger and its words stand out against the background.
- Say all your words out loud in a powerful voice when you have them altogether, before reading the whole poem out loud again.
- Draw and image of what comes to your head as you read the poem.

Shape Poems (or Calligrams) These are poems in which words or phrases are arranged into a particular shape which represents the poem's subject. AS in our poem the Tiger (see example below).

- Draw an outline of a tiger (look up an image online or in a book to help you).
- Using shape poem (calligram) Fill the space inside your outline with words from the poem that describe the tiger's power.






