

Our Intent:

• An involvement with others in the wider world and an appreciation of difference and diversity.

• A response to the distinctive ethos of a Church school and the content, language and symbolism of the Christian faith as a way of understanding our meaning and purpose in life.

• A willingness to explore Christian beliefs and values through a knowledge of Bible stories and Christian teaching in order that these might become a firm foundation for life.

- The ability to reflect upon experiences of awe, compassion, beauty, wonder
- The ability to persist and understand that experiences of disappointment, failure and loss can be occasions for spiritual growth and development
- A capacity to value the natural world and a commitment to care for creation
- A willingness to explore the ultimate questions and mysteries of life.



Implementation:

At St Mark's, we seek to find ways in which all areas of the curriculum can contribute to pupil's spiritual development and to highlight opportunities for these in our planning, collective worship, the learning environment and any other opportunities that we can celebrate spirituality.

- We seek to foster spiritual gifts, e.g.. imagination, insight and empathy.
- We allow children the opportunity to explore and express feelings and emotions, both in class and around the school by using prayer and reflection areas.
- We provide opportunities for prayer including silence, stillness and reflection.
- We share feelings and experiences that foster hope and joy, reassurance and encouragement.
- We encourage children to develop relationships based on the Christian values of love, forgiveness and service to others.
- We enable children to make the links between biblical values, the life of the school, our church relationships and the wider community.
